### Vintage Semi-auto Rifle

With the opening of our 200yd range, there has been some discussion as to possible safety issues in firing semi-auto high power rifles. After viewing a YouTube video of an M1 rifle blowing up in the hands of a shooter, I decided to undertake some research on this type of incident. First and foremost, I want to say that in a club such as ours, where membership is self-policing, the responsibility that the rifle and ammo brought to the Club is safe to use lies solely and completely with the shooter. If you bring a guest, you also have the responsiblity that he or she only bring safe firearms and ammo to the Club. (con't on pg 3)

There have been cases where semi-auto rifles have fired before the breech of the rifle has been fully locked. This condition appears to be nearly non-exsistent where issue ammo has been used in the rifle. The majority of the instances appears to be caused when reloaded ammo is used. I have done some testing and great deal of research as to the cause and prevention of "slam fires" and out of battery firing of the M1 Garand rifle. For the sake of this discussion, let's break it down to sections on the rifle and the ammunition.

#### The Rifle:

If the rifle is new to you and does not come from an approved source (such as CMP), or has had rework done on it, your parts substitution should be checked by a competent gunsmith or a person who is very familiar with this type of firearm.

Trigger pull should not be less than 4.5 pounds pull on the Garand or less than 3.5 pounds pull on the M1 Carbine or other semi-auto high power rifles.

The firearm should be properly lubricated using a product recommended for this application by the manufacturer or other knowledgeable source. For the M1 Garand or carbine, the field manual is as good as it is going to get. Do not over lubricate; grease and oil on the cartridges is not a good thing.

Firearms that are badly worn, have broken or chipped parts, or exhibit signs of excessive wear or head space problems should not be fired.

#### The Ammunition:

Generally, ammo that was manufactured for issue and use in a particular firearm is safe. Exemptions to this are: corroded ammo or M2 ball round issued for the M1 Garand that was manufactured prior to 1953 (see head stamp). Much of this earlier ammo was primed with corrosive primers. These early rounds will leave a coating of salt on the inside or the barrel that is nearly impossible to remove.

Reloaded ammo that was not formulated for use in the M1 Garand rifle, even though it is fine in bolt action or other types of firearms, may not be safe or reliable in the Garand. reloaded ammo for use in the Garand should be formulated for the M1 taking into account several possible problems that can cause damage to the gun or harm to the shooter. Be sure ammo has been loaded by yourself or a trusted source that undestands the Garand. Cases should be inspected for cracks, stretching, dents or deformations. Cases that exhibit any of the aforementioned should be disosed of without reloading. If the primer pocket has been crimped (a common thing in M2 ball ammo), the crimp must be removed using a primer pocket reamer tool.

Cases should be measured for length and anything above 2.940" should be trimmed. cases should always be full length size, being sure to use a press that is capable of handling this operation. RCBS and others are making a small base (SB) die set that forms the body of the case 2-3 thousandths smaller than the regular full length die. This reduces the chance of malfunction in the rechambering process.

Cases being loaded for the first time or having been trimmed should be deburred using a deburring tool inside and out. Primer pockets need to be cleaned in order to remove any firing residue in the pocket that might prevent the new primer from seating properly in the case.



Propellant chosen should have a burn rate greater than IMR 3110 but less than IMR 4320. Lists of burn rates for gunpowder are found in newer loading manuals such as the Lyman (edition 49 or 50) or online from several sources. Bullets used should not be less than 150 grain or more than 200 grain. This weight range keeps the gas piston at about 6000 pounds psi, optimum for action of the M1 Garand without causing damage to the operating rod. Use of loading data formulated for the M1, not just 30-06, is recommended.


Another possible cause to the non-locking problem may be found in single loading a round and slowly

closing the action, called "riding the bolt." There is a device sold by Amazon called S.L.E.D. or single loading device for the M1 Garand. This



is snapped into the breech of the Garand and will allow single loading of a round into the chamber in the same manner as if it were being fed from a magazine. After

the round is fired, the Garand will extract and eject the fired casing and leave the breech open



to load another round into the rifle.

Ammuntion can be safely reloaded for use in the M1 Garand. Some special methods and procedures will prevent most chances of a slam fire or open bolt incident. A light crimp on the case mouth secures the bullet in the case mount and prevents separation during rapid fire strings.

Any ammunition reloaded for use in a semi-auto should follow the aforementioned steps.
